As Australia already has a successful single frame competition in place it seems that we should fall into line with this annual event and rather than being a one off challenge, One Frame Exhibits of Postal Stationery should have a continuing presence at this show.

Postal Stationery exhibiting and collecting in Australia is strong and the people involved have developed a mutual bond. So we now need to encourage these people to extend their range of collecting and exhibiting to include One Frame Exhibits.

One Frame Exhibits are both a source of new exhibitors and a chance for the dedicated to demonstrate their exhibiting abilities even more.

There are a myriad of subjects that could be chosen and like all other One Frame Exhibits just extracting a frame from a multi framed exhibit without much additional work could and should get you nowhere. So we need fresh initiatives, firstly from the converted.

Some of these may be (and they will all have to be clearly cameo exhibits which cannot be expanded within their period/theme): -

- Development of just one issue or item
- Issues of just one monarch
- Issues of one particular service (Registered, Wrappers etc)
- Formular Cards
- Printing processes
- Design processes

**FEEDBACK**

David Collyer

I liked the Curtis article on *Classifying Privately Overprinted, Stamped To Order, And Printed To Private Order Victorian Colonial Newspaper Wrappers*. The illustrations show in flow chart terms how the various systems operated. A similar set of charts could assist in explaining the systems currently available to users of Australia Post Stationery.

Do you have a better illustration of Steve Schumann's item as illustrated on page 27. I can not make out whether the 1d KGV side face is imprinted or is an attached stamp. [It is an impressed stamp. Ed] Similar letter sheets were used between 1917-1917 for various purposes by the Department of Defence. Several are illustrated in the 1988 Supplement to Bob Emery's *Postal History of the AIF* pages 127-129, but each is endorsed OHMS and postmarked with a "paid" machine marking.

[By coincidence Prestige Philately's auction on 15 May 2004 included two of these sheets: *Lettersheets (PTPO) 1918 (Sept & Oct) Sideface 1d red Die I two Defence Department lettersheets with roneo'd appeals from the Minister in Charge of Recruiting for the recipient to enlist, minor blemishes. The first refers to "...the pamphlet [being sent] by this mail..." while the other - numbered '2' under the flap - refers to "the last pamphlet sent to you..."*. See illustration below. Ed].



In the colour illustrations there is a 1935 NZ Pictorial ½d postcard uprated with a 1/- 1935 Pictorial stamp. Lionel Savins tells me that the ½d postcard was issued on 1 May 1935 and replaced by a KGVI version in mid 1939. I cannot find a mention of this in the text. I hope the following would be of use on the postal history side.

Posted Wellington on 13 July. Would have crossed the Tasman by steamer to Sydney to pick up the Air service. TEAL did not start Trans Tasman flights until May 1940. On arrival in Sydney it would have picked up the Qantas / Imperial Airways flying boat service to UK. Direct flying boat services to Australia commenced on 26 June 1938 arriving at Sydney on 5<sup>th</sup> July. The first service from Sydney departed on 5<sup>th</sup> July and arrived at Southampton on 18<sup>th</sup> July. The route went from Sydney along the East Coast to Townsville and then west across Cape York, the Gulf of Carpentaria and Arnhemland to Darwin and then onto Singapore. The

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Singapore to Karachi sector was flown by crews from Indian Transcontinental Airways who were in fact British Imperial Airways staff. The Karachi to Southampton sector was flown by Imperial Airways crews. In this case mail to Czechoslovakia was off loaded at Athens as shown by the Greek 'Currency Control' marking just under the NZ coast of arms. The Athens to Praha (Prague) sector could have been flown by what service was available, generally German or French airlines.

The boxed marking in the bottom left corner is an airmail postmark for Praha. The digit 18 at the right is the time of arrival 18:00 hours. Being based on the Austrian system, airmail and other forms of express mail services were handled by the Telegraph Office, thus the "Telegraphie..." handstamp on the same date but at 20:00 hours. Am not sure what the significance of the numbers 5859 in black and 5318 in green is but they frequently appear on central European mail. Is there a copy of the back and does it show any additional markings? [The reverse of the card is illustrated below. It does not bear any additional postal markings.]

**RECENT ACQUISITIONS**

In the August 1998 issue of the Postal Stationery Collector, John Sinfield wrote of PTPO doubleton wrappers with George VI 2½ d. red embossed all addressed to the USA and to the same addressee. Recently I acquired a 2½ d. red George VI wrapper to the same addressee with an extra 2½ d. red George VI stamp added. (Figure 1).

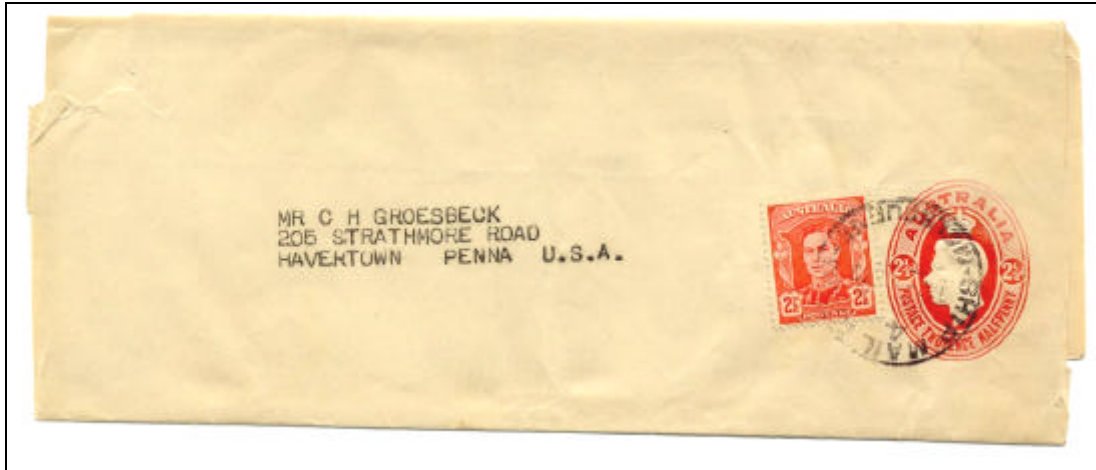

I thought members may be interested in this as well as the other items I have acquired over the past few months.

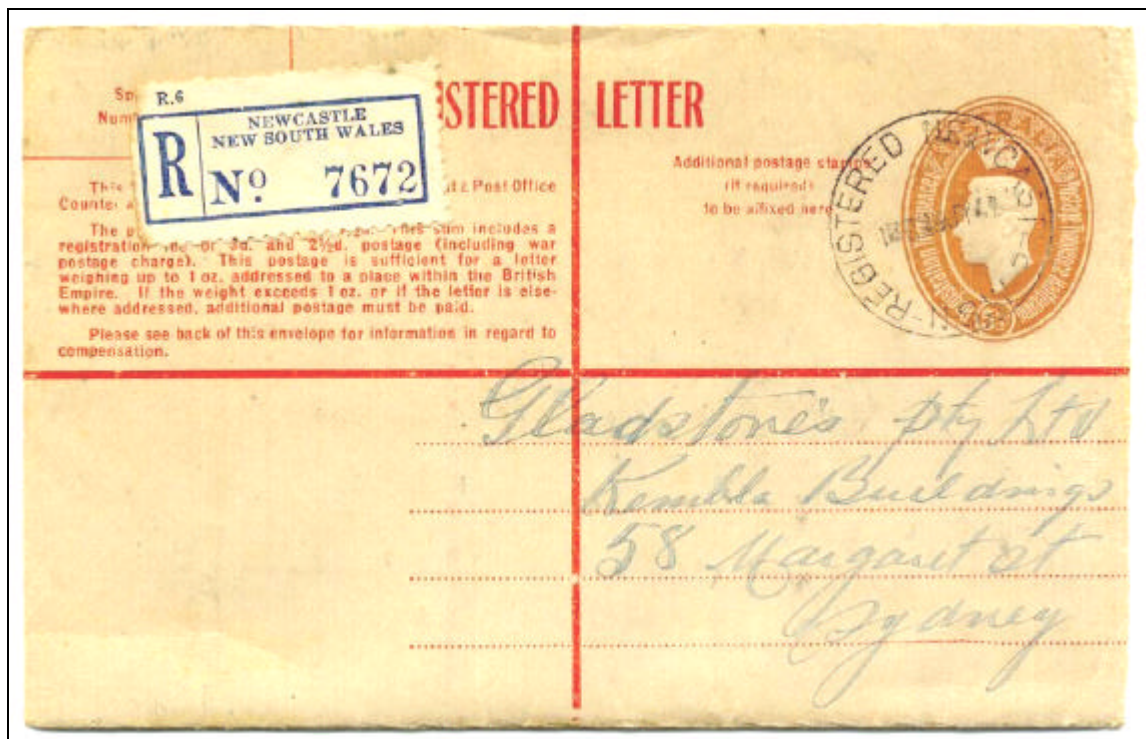

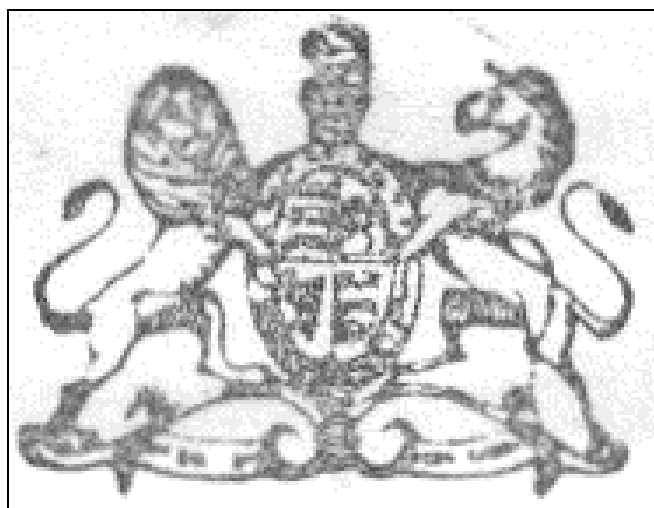


Figure 2: Coat of Arms Type I

Two 5½ d. George VI registered envelopes with flap on the right. Both used in 1942. One local use Newcastle to Sydney, unfortunately the flap is missing but it has left a clear impression where it has been, the other is a censored item from Headquarters Division 1 situated at Adelaide River in the Northern Territory in 1942. It is interesting as the cancel is **Field P.O. 0137** and the registration label is **APO 0127**. Both divisions were at Adelaide River during the period of the posting but nowhere is it written that these two commands shared the same tent. The backs of both are the same with the last four lines of text at the left having the first letters of each of these lines compressed (Figures 2, 3 & 4).

A small envelope for returning an undeliverable registered letter. This is a Dead Letter Office, Brisbane, Q'ld. issue, used in 1935. The manuscript notation on the back indicates that the item returned was R694. Unfortunately I do not have the enclosure (Figure 5).

Whilst on a trip to Sydney for the Petersham Fair I visited a dealer out of the area and found quite a few items for my collecting fields including a 1d. green Queen Mother wrapper (ASC.W15, H & G 16).

This wrapper is much lighter in shade and thinner, almost transparent, in texture than others in my collection. Perhaps others have a similar type? (Figure 6)

Another item is a hand painted New South Wales 1d. red Postal Card (H & G 19) used in 1903. I acquired this as I collect *post* cards with paintings or drawings on the reverse side. (Figures 7 & 8).

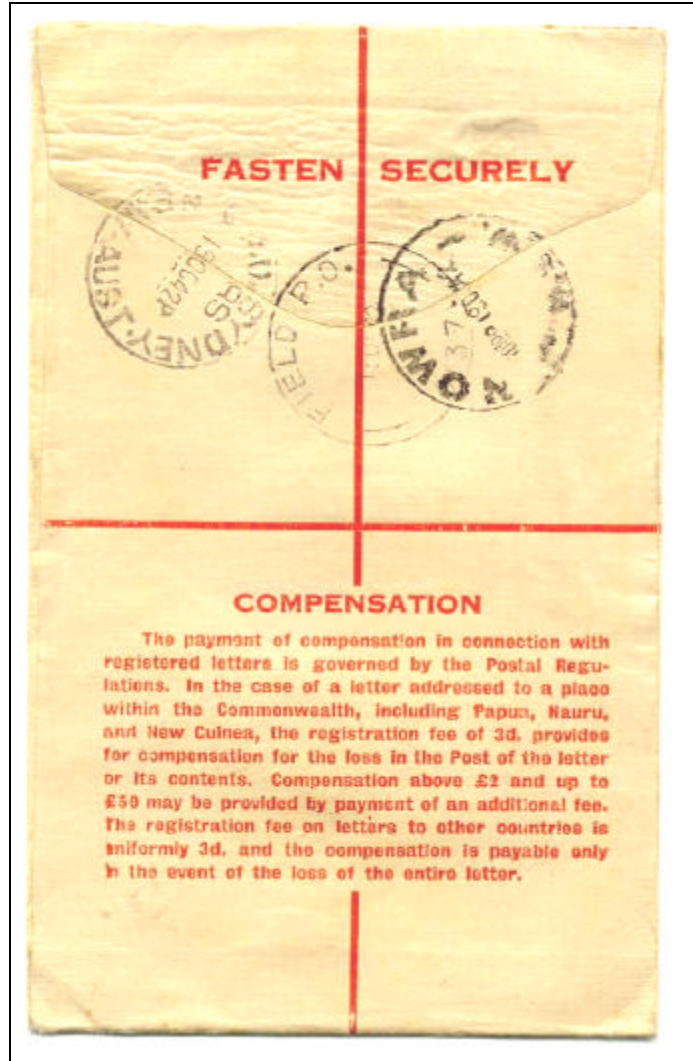

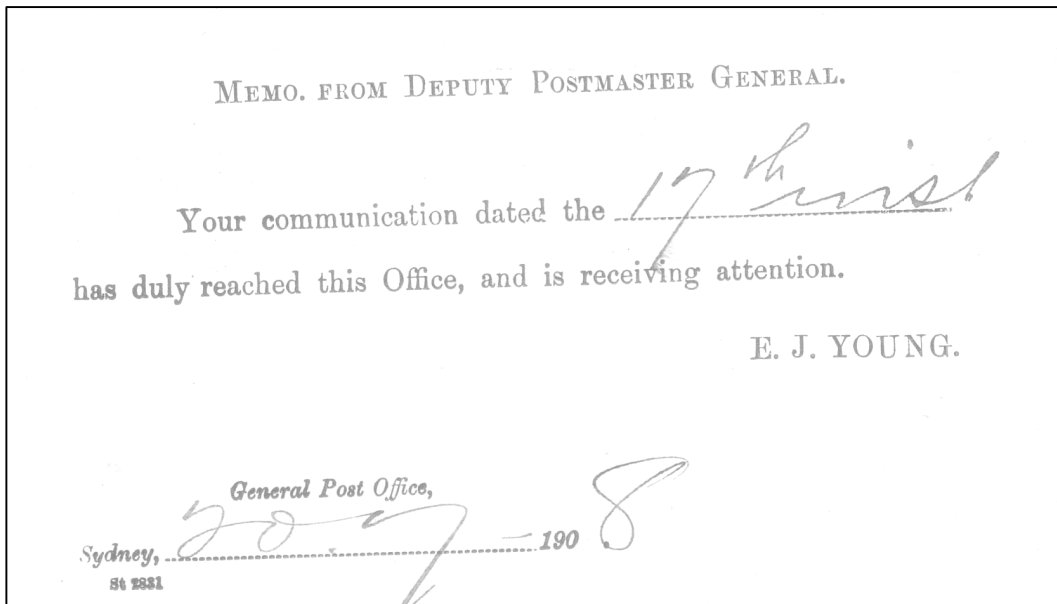
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**POSTAL STATIONERY: ITEMS OF CHARACTER**

We have seen how the use of the Title OHMS or such similar heading [On His Majesty's Service] does not in itself entitle the sender to free postage. This privilege could only be authorised by Parliament. The terms of the privilege were contained in its laws and regulations. How then can we account for the use of the postmark without stamp on the above Post Card? We need to have reference to the regulations in force at the time (1908) for the dispatch of official mail by the Postmaster General's Department.



The card was a communication acknowledging the receipt of correspondence and advising that it was "receiving attention"

***DIFFERENTIATING COAT OF ARMS TYPES ON SOUTH AUSTRALIA NEWSPAPER WRAPPERS***

**Introduction**

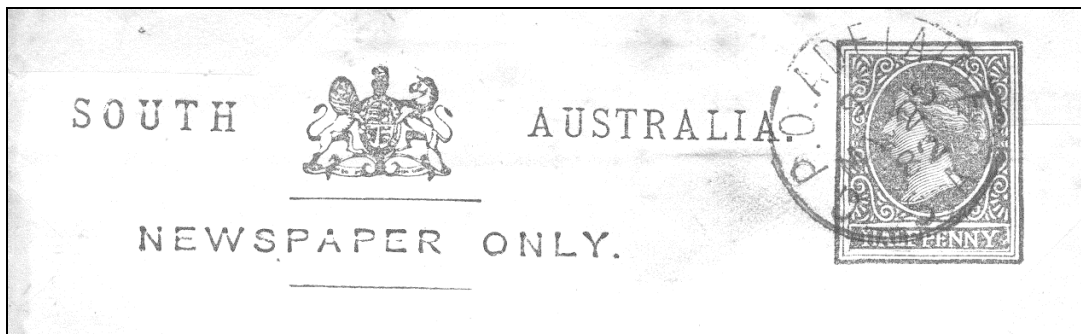
Newspaper wrappers issued by South Australia between 1882 and 1911 display a similarity in terms of the indicium of Queen Victoria and the upper-case wording 'South Australia' and 'Newspaper Only'.

Robson Lowe (1962) lists nine regular wrapper issues and seven Official issues with overprinted letters O.S. Six of the nine regular issues show an indicium sideface portrait of QV in mauve or violet with the Royal Coat of Arms located between the words 'South' and 'Australia'.

The purpose of the paper is to explain how the Coat of Arms insignia can be analysed to differentiate the various issues in ways apart from their three size differences: 14x11mm, 14x9.5mm and 20.5x11.5mm. The first two Arms sizes are often difficult to differentiate, especially when examining scans that are reproduced in other than their original sizes.

**Type I Coat of Arms 1882**

The first South Australian newspaper wrapper was issued in 1882 with an indicium that shows large white inner borders. This is reproduced in Figure 1.

The width of the wording 'South Australia' from 'S' to the stop beyond 'A' is 71x3mm and for 'Newspaper Only' including the stop 47x2mm. The top bar is 18.75mm and the lower one 17.75mm with a gap between of 8.75mm.

The major differentiating characteristic of this printing vis-à-vis the later issues, apart from the indicium, is the style of the Royal Coat of Arms.

The unique characteristics of Type I Coat of Arms, which is shown in Figure 2 are its measurement of 14x11mm, oval shield & two ribbons at base without Latin inscription, symmetrical curls under shield, crown above narrow, tall & open, differences in lion's face, neck, tail, shading of right leg; unicorn's horn 25°, no line back of eye, sash around neck extends to outer shield, tail shaped as an S & unshaded at base.

### Type II Coat of Arms 1884

There are a number of differences between the 1882 and 1884 issues. There are no stops after 'South Australia' and 'Newspaper Only'. The measurements thereby shrink slightly to 66-67x3.5mm and 45-46x2.5mm respectively, while the letters are slightly taller.

The bars are unaltered at 18.5-19mm with a gap between of 8.5mm. Arms differences aside, the first quick method of differentiation is to look for the absence of a stop after the lettering. This 1884 issue is shown in Figure 3.

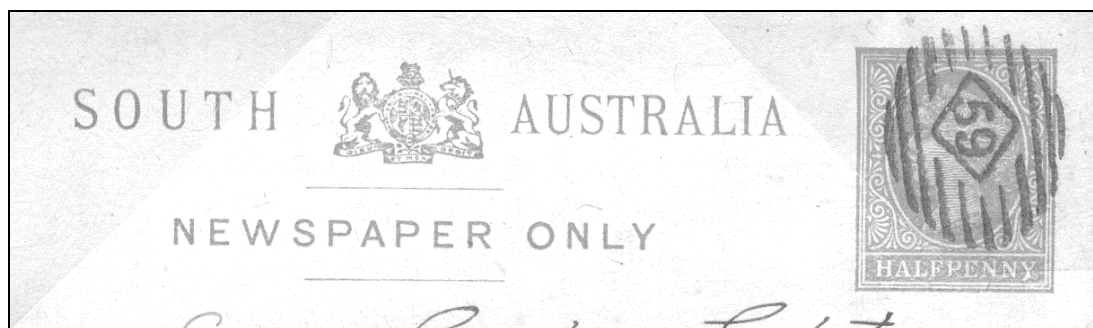
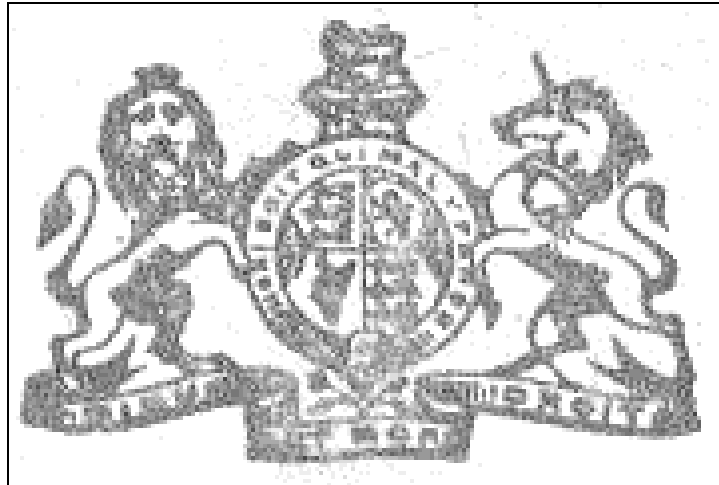

With regard to Coat of Arms Type II, at first glance there does not appear to be any difference from Type I, for the lion is full faced in both. Closer inspection reveals some quite startling differences, especially with regard to the shield, crown and Latin inscription. Type II is shown in Figure 4.

The unique characteristics of this Coat of Arms are its slightly smaller width of 14x9.5mm, round shield above crossed thistles & roses, Latin inscription on shield reads HONI SOIT QUI MAL Y PENSE, scrolled ribbons at base read DIEU ET MON DROIT, wider crown, lion fuller face, thick club-like end of tail, unicorn horn 65°, tail more swan-like, shading of both lion and unicorn darker on right legs, and double-edged ribbon under feet. Other smaller shading and design differences can be noticed when the two types are placed side-by-side. A quick technique to detect the difference between Type I and Type II is to look for the Latin inscription.

### **Type III Coat of Arms 1906**

The new die used by the Government Printer, Adelaide, shows several differences from the preceding issues, but none are so apparent than the change in the Coat of Arms.

The wording 'South Australia' is taller and wider at 70x3.5mm, while the wording 'Newspaper Only' is shorter at 42.5x2.5mm. Some of the letters of Australia are not exactly on the same horizontal plain, e.g., 'AL'. The gap between the 2mm shorter 16.5mm bars is 8.5mm. This new die is shown in Figure 5.

There are many unique characteristics of Type III Arms shown in Figure 6. The size of the Arms increases dramatically to 20.5x11.5mm, oval shield with strap not touching bottom ribbon, crown with pearl, clearer and more readable Latin inscription, lion is facing toward the crown and tongue is protruding up, more definition of mane, three-fingers of right paw, more shading on both the lion and unicorn, left (right) back foot of lion (unicorn) further forward on ribbon, lion's horizontal tip of tail, gaps under top legs, unicorn face & mane more defined and "pretty", horn 30°, double-edged ribbons twisted underneath & facing centre. Further differences can be found in the definition within the shield itself.

Without the need for a magnifier, the quickest way to differentiate Type III is the lion facing towards the crown, as well as a bigger Coat of Arms.

The issue of 1908 that followed two years later differs in a major way. Wording is added:

‘Commonwealth of Australia’ with stop measuring an overall 51x2.5mm, and located above ‘South Australia’ (72x3.5mm) and ‘Newspaper Only’ (44x2.5mm). The bars are 16mm with a reduced gap between of 7mm. The Arms are Type III also, which is the last of the different Arms Type issued on South Australia newspaper wrappers.

### Quick Detection Keys

Postal stationery and “country” collectors face some frustration in not having useful resource material about wrappers to differentiate the different issues. Robson Lowe (1962) notes only the Arms measurement differences.

The Internet is systematically using scanned images to replace hard-copy postal auction catalogues. The difficulty for collectors is that scanned images are often not exactly the same as the original size, thereby causing fine millimeter measurements to be awkward and unreliable. To help overcome these problems, a table below summarizes the major differentiating characteristics of the three Arms Types. These pointers can be used to examine scans with improved reliability for detecting differences.

### Basic Differentiating Characteristics

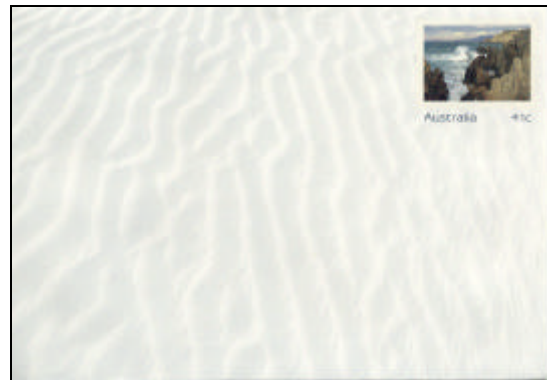

**AUSTRALIAN POSTAL STATIONERY SET**

On 23 August 1989 Australia Post issued a set of seven 41c postal stationery envelopes featuring National Parks in the stamp area. They are listed in the current *Australasian Stamp Catalogue* (ASC) (1) as follows:

E228	41c Wilsons Promontory (Vic)	C6
E229	41c Fitzgerald River (WA)	C6
E230	41c Millstream Falls (Qld)	DL
E231	41c Uluru (Olgas) (NT)	C6
E232	41c Cradle Mt (Tas)	DL
E233	41c Flinders Ranges (SA)	C6
E234	41c Koscuisko (NSW)	C6



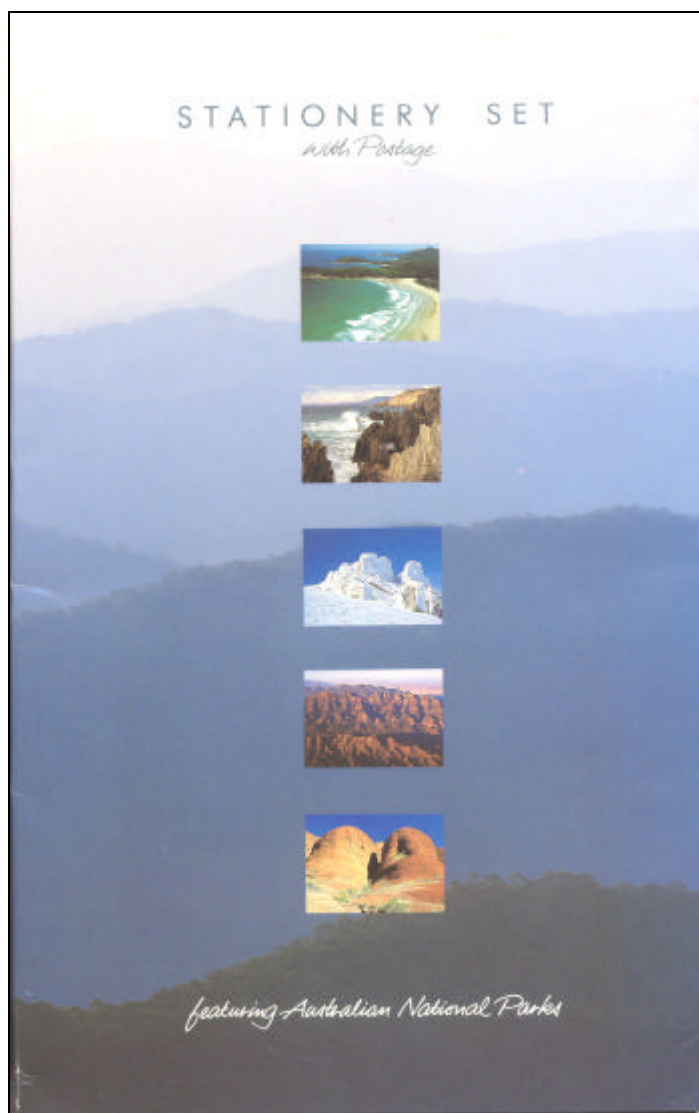
The envelopes were made of coloured paper, described as 'Postspeed', with subtle designs that complemented the views in the stamp areas. They were announced in *Australian Stamp Bulletin* August- September 1989 (2).

Although this issue was regarded as a definitive one, it did not have a long life, due to a previously announced rise in postal rates, set for 1 September 1989 (3). The envelopes were gradually withdrawn from sale and replaced with a new series of 'Postage Paid' envelopes, which used the same National Park designs. The first of these postage paid envelopes were in larger sizes, as follows:

E235	\$1.00 Wilsons Promontory	C5
E236	\$2.00 Uluru (Olgas)	C4
E237	\$2.50 Fitzgerald River	B4

They were issued on 30 October 1989. Two postage paid envelopes in DL size, featuring Cradle Mt (E238) and Millstream Falls (E239) were issued on 10 January 1990.

Late in 1989, perhaps in time for Christmas, Australia Post put out a 'letter writing set' with ten stationery envelopes (two of each of the five designs in C6 size from the August 1989 issue), and 20 sheets of matching paper. They were housed in an attractive folder with the heading 'Stationery set with postage featuring Australian National Parks'. The five chosen stamp designs are shown on the front of the folder. The background of the cover has a pattern of mountain views from Mt Hotham. In order to accommodate future rises in postal rates, the following note appears inside the cover 'Prepaid postage on envelopes only covers current 41c domestic postal rate. If required, further postage may be affixed'.




The following appeared in "Specialists' Notes" in *Australian Stamp Bulletin* October-December 2004 (4):

*Australia Post is about to release a superb new Stationery Set, aimed at making letter writing a pleasure. This most attractive and practical Stationery Set will make an ideal Christmas gift. Priced at \$11.95, the Set will be on sale from 18 October 1989. The new Australia Post Stationery Set contains ten current definitive pre-stamped envelopes from the Australian National Parks series - two each of the C6 size envelopes. With the envelopes comes a pack of twenty sheets of writing paper, softly patterned to match the subtle backgrounds of the envelopes. Paper, envelopes and postage - complete in one package!*

*It will be available from all official post offices, or by mail order from the Philatelic Bureau, GPO Box 9988, Melbourne VIC 3001. Philatelists should note that the pre-stamped envelopes contained in the Australia Post Stationery Set have already been released in their own right. Therefore, there will be no first day of issue postmarking in conjunction with the Set's release.*

The following paragraph appeared in "Specialists' Notes" in *Australian Stamp Bulletin* January- March 1990 as part of an article about Postage Prepaid Envelopes:

*The complete letter writing set*

The new Australia Post Stationery Set contains 10 pre-stamped envelopes from the Australian National Parks series, plus a pack of 20 sheets of writing paper to match the 5 envelope designs.

**A MAGNIFICENT GIFT**  
Paper, envelopes and postage - Your complete letter writing set!

**ORDER FOR CHRISTMAS, NOW.**  
You can order your National Parks Stationery Set from your Stamp Bulletin for \$11.95, including postage worth \$4.10. See order form for details.

‘Existing C6 and DL pre-stamped envelopes are withdrawn from general sale from 9 January. However, these products will continue to be available from philatelic counters and by mail order until further notice. The five C6 envelopes will also remain available as components of the popular letter writing set, for the time being’. (5)

The National Parks designs continued in use on postage paid envelopes through 1990 and into 1991. In the latter year, they appeared on the first Australia Post issues of prepaid stationery that used recycled paper.

This folder is not in ASC stationery listings, and I’m not sure if Robin Linke included it in his latest price list. I think it should have a place in any listing of Australian postal stationery envelopes. Might it appear in the listing when the long-awaited catalogue of Australian Commonwealth postal stationery is published?

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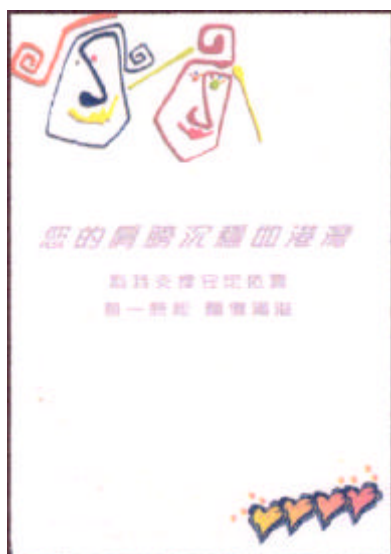
**TAIWAN THANKSGIVING LOTTERY POSTAL CARDS**

For the first time Chungwa Post, Taiwan, issued four cards on April 13, 2004, for Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Graduation Congratulations, with the aim of encouraging the use of postal cards for these occasions.



A quantity of 500,000 of each card was issued. Those who held cards with a valid postal cancellation dated no later than August 10, 2004 could participate in the lottery that was drawn on August 20, 2004. Cash prizes were provided to the first four winners and philatelic items to the 4th, 5th and 6th winners.

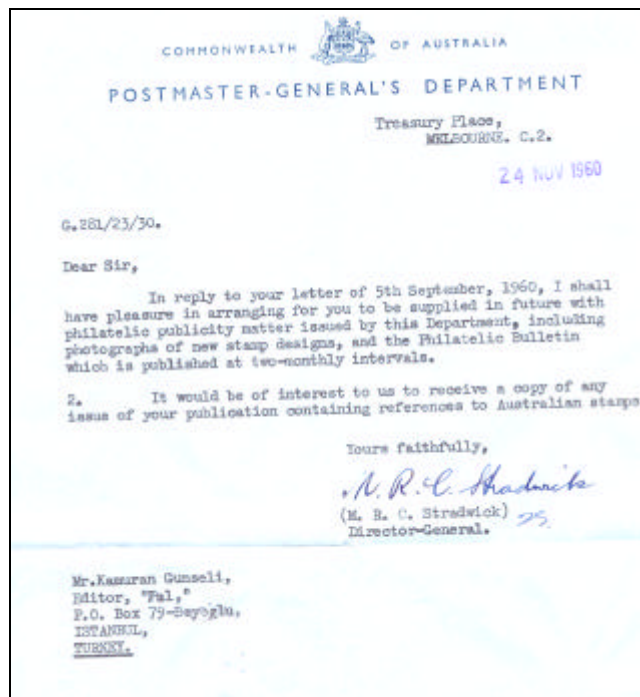


**AUSTRALIAN OFFICIAL AEROGRAMME**

The Australian Official aerogramme used in the late 1950s and early 1960s is often seen overprinted specimen as sold by the Post Office to collectors but is less commonly seen used. The aerogramme was issued about 1 August 1959 and is based on the 10d aerogramme issued on 8 April 1959 with the 10d replaced by 'OHMS'. Illustrated below is a copy I recently acquired from Ebay. This copy was used in November 1960 to Turkey by the Post Office to confirm that the recipient would in the future be receiving the Philatelic Bulletin.

One of PSSA's members, Jerry Kasper, has an excellent one-frame exhibit of Australian official aerogrammes. 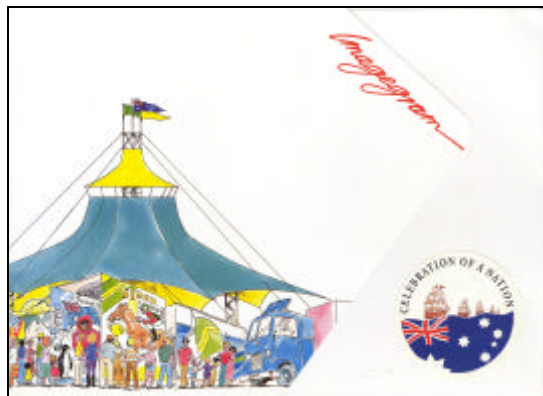
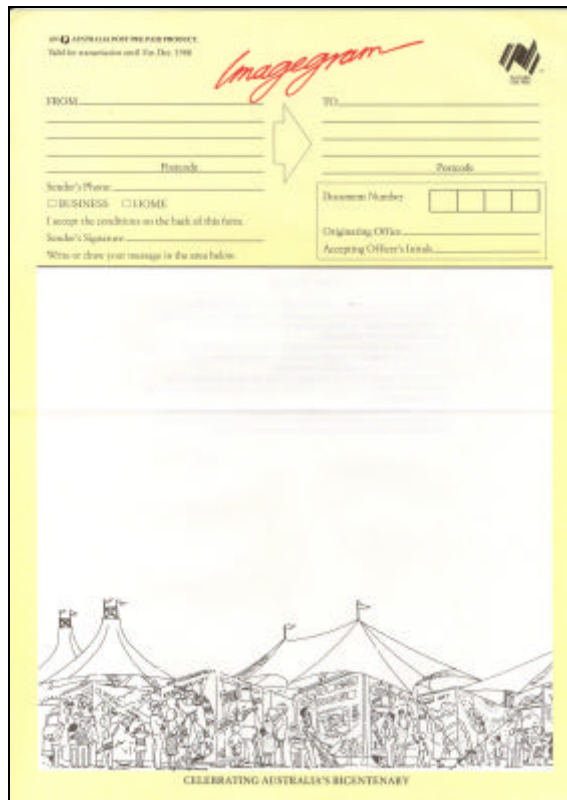

Lodge it here at the Temporary Post Office or at any of more than 450 fax centres, located at most major Post Offices around Australia. Your personal message will be delivered Australia wide on the next working day & as soon as possible to any of 60 international destinations. Imagegram, it's like a telegram with imagination.*

**MEETING AT CANBERRA STAMPSHOW 2004**

The meeting was held at 3.30pm on Sunday 14 March 2004 in the Orpheus Room at the Hellenic Club of Canberra, Matilda St Woden. In attendance were Ian McMahon (Chair), Derek Pocock, Ross Wood, Bernie Beston, John Sinfield, Martin Walker, Gary Brown, John Bell, Ross Duberal, John Dibiase, Neville Solly and Judy Kennett, also visitors Michel Roland, Paul Xavier and Robert Gooding.

Apologies were received from Margaret Hamilton, Gary Watson, Linda Lee, Jan Gane, Betty

van Tenac, Norman Banfield, Chris Smith, John Wilkins, Joan Orr, Derek Brennan, John Crowsley and David Collyer.

### **Financial report**

A financial report from Treasurer John Crowsley was circulated to the meeting.

### **Secretarial report**

The Secretary gave a verbal report on activities since the last meeting of the Society. Membership currently stood at 97, with a few 2004 subscriptions not yet paid. Exchange of information with overseas postal stationery collectors' groups continues. The Secretary has sent reviews of the *Listing of Australian non-denominated and flat rate postal stationery* to the journal of SAS / Oceania [USA] and to the Journal of the Postal Stationery Society [UK].

The Society currently sends out nine exchange and deposit copies of each issue of *Postal Stationery Collector*. We have recently begun an exchange with the journal of the Australian Cover Society Inc.

The Secretary urged members who felt they could help with running the Society to contact either the Coordinator or herself. A member to help with Society publicity would be most welcome, but our biggest need is a member to design and maintain a web page of our own. This would greatly help with publicizing our existence.

### **Business**

Ian reported that there was an updated version of the **Listing**, which covered stationery issued until December 2003. Copies were available at the meeting.

D Pocock suggested that the Society apply for a meeting slot at Swan River Stampshow, and offered to fix it. B Beston proposed that we ask for a meeting slot at Sydney 2005, the International, to be held in April 2005. D Pocock asked if the Society would be donating a prize for the postal stationery class at Swan River Stampshow. This has already been approved by the 'executive' (Coordinator, Secretary and Treasurer).

J Sinfield raised the matter of NVI cards, which are not announced by Australia Post. He has spoken to Australia Post, and was advised that Malcolm Groom has a typed list of NVI material issued. It was suggested that it might be published in PSC, or as an addendum to the **Listing**. It was suggested that Australia Post be asked if they could, at some time, publish details of NVI material in advance of issue.

B Beston suggested that we should write to Australia Post, and ask them to publish postcards in booklets, rather than as separate items.

I McMahan reminded the members present that he was always looking for articles and other material for future issues of PSC.

M Walker commented on the suggestion made by Gary Watson in a recent Prestige Auction catalogue that Postal Notes should be classified as revenue issues as the poundage fee was a government charge and not a fee for a postal service. He asked what attendees thought about the status of postal notes. The meeting recognized that the actual status was very dependent on the definition of poundage. B Beston offered to raise the matter at the next FIP Postal Stationery Commission meeting, and report back.

Another member reported sighting a copy of a special telegram form prepared for the Bicentennial (1988). J Sinfield mentioned the Lleyton Hewitt postcards issued by Australia Post for the 2004 Australian Open Tennis Championship. They were available at the courts during the event, but have been hard to find since. Some post offices secured copies of the cards, while others received advertising posters, but no cards!

J Dibiasi asked if international reply coupons (IRCs) were regarded as postal stationery. Bernie Beston volunteered to raise the matter at the next meeting of the of the FIP Postal Stationery Commission in Singapore.

### **Display**

At the conclusion of business, Ross Wilson presented a display of postal cards of Czechoslovakia for the period 1918-1938. The display commenced with overprinted and surcharged Austrian cards from the transition period, and included examples from the different series of illustrated cards issued in the 1930s. I McMahon thanked Ross for his display, and closed the meeting.

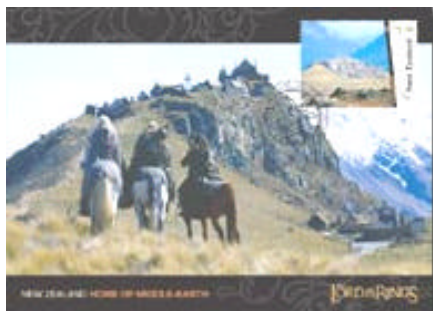

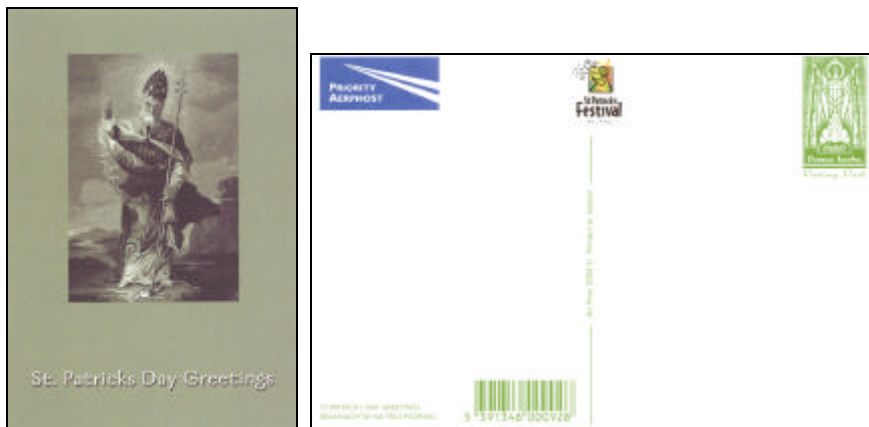

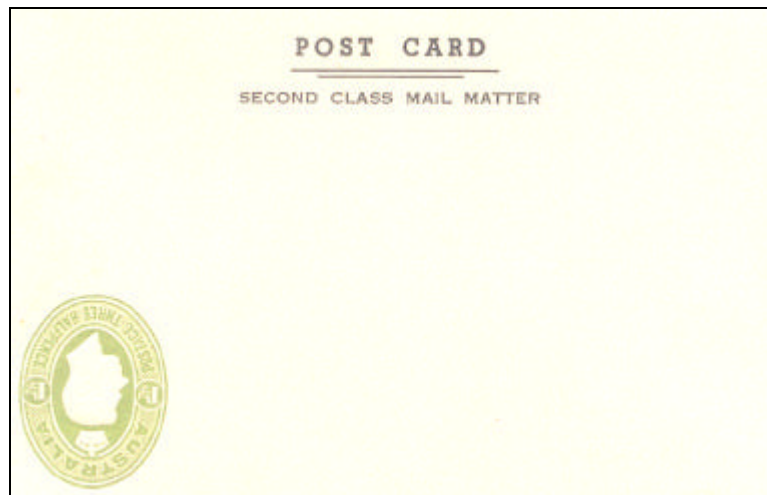
