

Praga 2018

Praga 2018 was a specialised world (FIP) exhibition with Traditional, Postal History, Literature and One Frame classes held in Prague from 15-19 August 2018. While there was no postal stationery class at Praga 2018, the *Postal Stationery Collector* received a Vermeil in the Literature class while Peter Fink received 78 points for a one-frame exhibit on *Christmas Aerogramme World War II*.

Also, in the Literature class were Special Catalogue of Postal Stationeries [sic] Czech Republic 1995-2007 by Wilfred Osthues which received a Large Vermeil, The Postal Stationery of Ecuador (1884-2017) by Georg Maier which received a Vermeil, Pakistan Overprints on Service Postcards of British India With Forms Used by North Western Railways by Usman Ali Isani Vermeil and Romanian Postal Stationery by 1879-1956 by Galina Chudesova.



MACAO 2018

Macao 2018, the 35th Asian International Stamp Exhibition, was held from 21 to 24 September 2018 in Macau. The Exhibition included 21 postal stationery exhibits including two one-frame exhibits and two Youth exhibits. Three Gold medals were awarded including one to an Australian exhibitor, Bernard Beston, for his exhibit *Ecuador – The Postal Stationery 1884-1938*. Other Australian exhibitors were Tony Griffin who received a Large Vermeil for *Postal and Lettercard Development in the Austro-Hungarian Empire* and Ian McMahon who received a Vermeil for *Post Bands and Wrappers of Canada*. The Postal Stationery volume of the Australian Commonwealth Specialists' Catalogue received a Gold medal in the Literature Class while the Postal Stationery Society of Australia's Journal, the *Postal Stationery Collector* received a Vermeil, a high award at an international exhibition for a Society journal.



Among the other postal stationery exhibits were three exhibits of the postal stationery of Macau, a one-frame exhibit of Macau aerogrammes, a Gold medal exhibit of the cherry blossoms postcards of Japan, French Indo-China postal stationery, the return postcards of Korea, Sun Yat-sen postcards of China, Persian postal stationery, Japanese international postcards and Transvaal postal stationery.

Also, on display was an invited exhibit from Martin Walker on international reply coupons as part of the UPU display at the Exhibition which included competitive frames from many postal administrations of their recent stamp issues.

Chen Yu-An displayed a unique essay of the 1½c Junk Design Lettercard from 1918 in the Court of Honour. The first Chinese lettercard was a 3c 'Wheat' design lettercard issued in 1919 and no lettercards were issued with the Junk design.

FEEDBACK

I read with interest Tony Scott's small article on page 71 on Field Service Postcards. I am a collector of these issues and can confirm the comments made by Tony. They are scarce and do not come up for sale very often. Prices seem to range around \$10 to \$30. Most were used in World War I, although I do have a couple of World War II examples in my collection. I note that Tony's is from World War II.

My collecting is limited to those Field Service Post Cards either bearing Australian stamps or carrying an Australian postal address. I have built my collection around the variations in layout and printing on the front side of the cards, and the Printer's identification descriptions on the reverse side of the cards. For example, some cards have seven lines of instruction while others have eight lines, the Coat of Arms comes in two very different sizes, and there are variations with full stops/no full stops after "CARD", "5248" and "2042" on the front side of the cards.

I have attached the reference chart that I have developed as I build my collection.

Like Tony, I would love to hear from fellow collectors of this unusual military postal item.

NEW ZEALAND DATESTAMP POSTCARDS: KIWI DESIGN

Since 1976, New Zealand has issued special postcards for its pictorial date-stamp postcard.

In 2004 a postcard design featuring the Stewart Island Kiwi designed by Maggie Atkinson was introduced with the postcard being denominated 45c.

Since then, in response to increases in the charge for the service, the postcards have been issued in 50c (2007), 60c, 70c, 80c and \$1 denominations, all in a similar design. On the \$1 postcard the attribution of the design to Maggie Atkinson has been removed. The reverse of all postcards includes a description of the special postmarks service. Alan Tunnicliffe from New Zealand advises that a \$1.20 datestamp issue should be issued in the next month.


FURTHER EXAMPLES OF THE USE OF CUT-OUTS AND INTERESTING USAGE

From Lindsay Chitty is an envelope used in 1935 from Melbourne to New Zealand with a ½d King George V sideface cut-out from a wrapper and a 1½d New South Wales lettercard cut-out used to pay postage.

The cut-outs were not accepted for postage and the letter was taxed 4d.

From David Collyer is a 2018 cover used with three 22c cut-outs from PSEs added to a 24c PSE with a 10c adhesive stamp used (and accepted) to pay the \$1 postage.

COLLECTING FIJIAN POSTAL STATIONERY

Many Australian collectors collect the stamps of Pacific Island countries such as Fiji. Fiji has issued a relatively modest amount of postal stationery but with enough variety to provide an interesting collecting area. It is also served by an excellent handbook *The Postal Stationery of Fiji* by Ross Duberal published by The Pacific Islands Study Circle of Great Britain in 1998. This article seeks to provide a very quick overview of Fijian postal stationery.

Fiji did not issue postal stationery until May 1895. The impetus for Fiji issuing postal stationery was it joining the UPU, which it did as one of the British Australasian colonies on 1 October 1891.

Postcards and Lettercards

UPU regulations provided for members issuing postcards, reply postcards and lettercards. The imprinted stamp of the first issue had a design showing a canoe and palms (Figure 1). 1d single and reply postcards for domestic use, 1½d single and reply postcards for use to UPU countries and 1d lettercards (Figure 2) were ordered from the New South Wales Government Printer and first used in Fiji on 24 May 1895.




Figure 3 1/2 d on 11/2d 1903 postcard

Postcard rates were reduced to ½d within Fiji and to 1d elsewhere in 1903 and as a result the 1895 1d and 1½d postcards were surcharged 'HALF PENNY' (Figure 3).

The surcharged postcards were replaced by ½d single and reply and 1½d single and reply postcards depicting King Edward VII (Figure 4) in early 1904. The cards were produced by De La Rue, and as was common practice for British colonies at the time, a small number of the postcards were overprinted 'SPECIMEN' for distribution to members of the UPU. The reply postcards were not used to any great extent and were separated and sold as single cards. No King Edward VII lettercards were issued by Fiji.

The King Edward VII postcards remained on sale for some time with King George V 1½ d postcards (Figure 5) being issued in 1927 following the increase in the UPU postcard rate to 1½d. No 1½d reply or ½d King George V postcards were issued. A 2d King George V lettercard was issued in 1928.

Envelopes and wrappers

Fiji did not issue stamped envelopes until 1912 when 1d embossed King George V envelopes (Figure 6) printed by De La Rue were issued. The envelopes were issued in three different sizes and with a number of knife and paper variations. As with the postcards and lettercards, a small number were overprinted 'SPECIMEN' for distribution to members of the UPU. De La Rue also produced a ¼d King George V wrapper which was issued in 1917.




Figure 8 2d + 3d King George V registered envelopes.




Figure 10 2 ½ d + 6d Queen Elizabeth II registered envelopes






Figure 12 8c + 4c registered envelope used to Australia

Following an increase in the postage rate to 2d, 2d embossed envelopes were issued in 1921. These were used until about 1941 with no further stamped envelopes being issued until 1963 when 3d red Queen Elizabeth II stamped envelopes (Figure 7) were issued. This envelope and the other Queen Elizabeth II envelopes were produced by McCorquodale & Co. This was followed by a 2c green envelope in 1969 following the introduction of decimal currency and 3c and 4c envelopes in 1973 and 1977 as a result of postage rate increases. These envelopes show some knife and gum varieties and variations in the shades of the imprinted stamp. No further stamped envelopes were issued for many years when a range of non-denominated envelopes were issued. These have been previously reported in the *PSC*.

Registered Envelopes

While Fiji has issued relatively few postcards, lettercards, wrappers and stamped envelopes, registered envelopes proved more popular.

The first registered envelopes were issued in Fiji about 1911. These envelopes depicted King Edward VII and were denominated 1d + 3d (1d postage and 3d for the registration fee), produced by De La Rue and produced in three sizes. 1d + 3d King George V registered envelopes were issued in 1914, again in three sizes. Following the reduction in the registration fee to 2d, a 1d + 2d registered envelope was issued in 1923 in two sizes. 2d + 2d and 2d + 3d (Figure 8) registered envelopes were issued in 1926 and 1928 respectively following postage rate changes. 2d + 3d King George VI registered envelopes (Figure 9) appeared in 1944 (again in two sizes) with 2d+4d registered envelopes being issued in 1952. 2½d + 6d Queen Elizabeth II registered envelopes (Figure 10) were issued in 1955-1959.

In 1962, the contract for producing registered envelopes passed to McCorquodale who produced 3d + 9d Queen Elizabeth II registered envelopes in a new design (Figure 11). Registered envelopes of this design (Figure 12) continued to be issued (in two sizes) with frequent changes for postage rate increases until 1992 with the last issue

being the 9c + 60c value. In 1992 an 11c + 75c registered envelope (Figure 13) was issued with the portrait of Queen Elizabeth II removed.

Aerogrammes




Figure 14 Fiji Air Mail Lettercard used to Canada in 1946

As with many countries the first Fijian aerogrammes sold by the post office were unstamped. They were inscribed 'FIJI AIR MAIL LETTER CARD' and were first issued in 1944 in a number of discernible printings (Figure 14).

The first stamped aerogramme, inscribed 'AIR LETTER', was a 7d King George VI aerogramme (Figure 15) issued in 1947 using the standard British colonial key plate design inscribed 'Postage and Revenue' for the stamp. The unstamped aerogrammes continued in use as the postage rate for aerogrammes to New Zealand and other south Pacific islands was 3d at the time while the rate to Australia was reduced to 3d on 23 June 1947. A 3d aerogramme was issued in 1949. In 1951, the design of both values was modified so that there the inscription 'IF ANYTHING IS ENCLOSED THIS LETTER WILL BE SENT BY ORDINARY MAIL' was in four lines (Figure 16) rather than the three lines of the earlier issue.

A Queen Elizabeth II 3d aerogramme stamped with the standard British colonial key plate design was issued in 1955. As the UPU had formally introduced the designation of Aerogramme on 29 July 1953, the new forms were inscribed

'AEROGRAMME'. A modified design was issued in 1956 with the white border around the stamp removed (Figure 17).

Aerogrammes with the stamp design of the Annigoni portrait of Queen Elizabeth II were issued in 1957 (7d) and 1958 (3d). Following increases in aerogramme postage rates on 1 November 1958, 6d and 9d aerogrammes were issued in 1959. The new aerogrammes were on paper watermarked "IMPERIAL AIR MAIL' with a code letter, 'M' or 'L'. A palm tree design was added to the 6d aerogramme in 1962 (Figure 18) while a 10d aerogramme with canoe design was also issued following a further increase in the postage rate. These aerogrammes were also on watermarked paper with a letter code, 'P', 'T' or no code (6d), 'P', 'T', 'S', 'V', 'Z' or no code (10d). Forms without watermark have also been recorded. Following the introduction of decimal currency, 5c and 8c aerogrammes were issued.

One of the scarcest Fijian aerogrammes is the 5c on 8c aerogramme (Figure 19) issued on 23 August 1971 presumably due to a shortage of 5c aerogrammes. Very few commercially used examples have been recorded.






Figure 20 5c flying fish aerogramme

New larger 5c and 8c aerogrammes were issued in 1972 with the imprinted stamp featuring a flying fish design (Figure 20). The aerogramme rate was increased to 10c for all countries on 1 January 1976 with a 10c aerogramme (Figure 21) in the same design issued in 1975. In 1981 the stamp design was modified to show two flying fish. As a result of postage rate increases 15c (1981), 18c (1983), 21c (1988, Figure 22) and 25c (1992) aerogrammes were issued in the new design. The final aerogramme, inscribed 'POSTAGE PAID', in a larger format with a beach scene on the right and a modified flying fish stamp design (Figure 23) was issued in 1995.




Figure 24 Official use of a formular aerogramme

Fiji also issued a number of unstamped official aerogrammes for use by Government departments. These were inscribed 'O.H.M.S' or 'ON HER MAJESTY'S SERVICE' (Figure 24). Privately produced unstamped aerogrammes including some produced in the UK, Australia and New Zealand were also extensively used (Figure 25).




Figure 26 20c Fiji Postal Note







Figure 27 Prepaid Postcard for the 2003 South Pacific Games

Bicentenary of Parramatta Female Factory stamped envelope





Australia Post issued a stamped envelope selling for \$1.25 to mark the bicentenary of the Parramatta Female Factory on 5 July 2018. This envelope marks the 200th anniversary of Governor Macquarie laying the foundation stone for Australia's first purpose-built "female factory" on 9 July 1818. Francis Greenway designed the building based on workhouses and prisons in Britain and Europe. The envelope was designed by John White with the cover images by Augustus Earle. The portraits are of Anne Dunne, Emma Mayner and daughters, and Susannah Watson.

Domestic Postage with Tracking







Mark Diserio has reported a new Australia Post product. Australia Post introduced two new postal stationery envelopes in August 2018. The new envelopes are for a 'Domestic letter with tracking' Service and come in DL and C4 sizes selling for \$2.20 and \$5.25 (available from 24 September) respectively with discounts for bulk purchases. The new service is being trialled from 20 August 2018 to 31 January 2019 at a limited number of post offices and includes delivery and tracking. The service provides the same tracking as articles sent by Registered Post with the key difference being a scan on delivery rather than a signature on delivery. Additional insurance cover can be purchased

November 2018

as can priority delivery (50c). Martin Walker reports that the envelopes have proved very popular with eBay sellers. Mark also provided an image of a survey postcard for customers to provide feedback on the new service. The trial is being carried out at the following post offices:








Map of Australia PPEs – Address Corners and Reprint Dates




Postal Stationery Literature: New Zealand

Collectors of New Zealand postal stationery are well served by a comprehensive catalogue and handbook. The standard catalogue is the *New Zealand Postal Stationery Catalogue* edited by Robert Samuel who was, at the time of the Catalogue's publication, recognised as the expert on New Zealand postal stationery. The Catalogue was published in five parts. Volume 1 (first published 1976, last edition 1988) covered postcards including official (Department of Education) and printed to private order (PTPO) postcards, Part 2 (first published 1989, last edition 2001) covered lettercards, Part 3 (1993) regular issue stamped envelopes, Part 4 (1992) registered envelopes, wrappers and prisoner of war (POW) aerogrammes and Part 5 (1993) PTPO and official (Department of Education) envelopes.

At the time of his untimely death Robert Samuel had largely completed work on a postal stationery volume to be part of the *Postage Stamps of New Zealand*, a series of handbooks on New Zealand philately published by the Royal Philatelic Society of New Zealand. While earlier volumes in the series had included some information on New Zealand postal stationery, Robert Samuel's volume, completed under the editorship of Brian Vincent and which was

published in 2007 as Volume IX in the series, contained considerably more detail than the Catalogue as well as updating the earlier information and is an indispensable reference for collectors of New Zealand postal stationery.





It is the only comprehensive coverage in one volume of New Zealand's postal stationery. Chapters cover postcards, lettercards, registered envelopes, envelopes, newspaper wrappers, aerogrammes, government department printed franks, the 6d King Edward VII telegraph form, stamped adhesive labels (produced using the postal stationery dies), and postal notes. Coverage ranges from the first postcards of 1876 through 2003. Also covered are the various private stationery issued over the years, Department of Education postcards and envelopes and non-denominated stationery. There are two Appendices with illustrations of pictorial postcards and the advertisements on the reverse of lettercards and a comprehensive checklist.

In addition, Part IX also covers the postal stationery of Samoa, Cook Islands and Niue. Coverage of Samoa includes the German colonial issue, the occupation issues, New Zealand postal stationery overprinted 'SAMOA' and the modern aerogrammes. For Cook Islands the 1882-1884 postcards are listed while for Niue there is a single item, the \$1 airmail envelope of 1994.

Further information on the many non-denominated issues which New Zealand issued from 1988 onwards can be found in Volume VIII of the *Postage Stamps of New Zealand which* includes coverage of Easipost envelopes and satchels, pre-paid Handibags and prepaid Courier Post satchels.


An update to Volume IX can be found in Volume X of *Postage Stamps of New Zealand* published in 2013 and which includes new issues to 2009 as well as new discoveries on earlier issues. The listing includes non-denominated stationery as well as the pre-stamped envelopes and stamped postcards issued during this period.

Auctions: Noble Numismatics Sale 118 31 July to 3 August 2018

While most stamp collectors keep an eye on philatelic auctions, many will not have regularly checked numismatic auctions such as the Nobel Numismatic Sale 118. Their auction included a small number of philatelic lots including a range of Australian States and Commonwealth postal stationery including a number of scarce PTPO and Official items, albeit condition was not always as good as it might have been.

Lot 3138, for example, was described as Postal stationery, official envelope with heading 'On His Majesty's Service', as a stamped to order with engraved 'OS' electro on the 1d red kangaroo stamp, 1d 1913-4 period on a green envelope for the Postmaster-General's Department, Queensland as Money Order Advices, to Postmaster at Townsville, 15 Feb 1914; type 1 original die, (Kellow EO1A). Fine used, scarce. \$200 Sold for \$200.

Lot 3140 was described as Post card, 1913-1915, 1d kangaroo, with O.H.M.S. overprints, one with centre of card other (2) above 1d kangaroo stamp, issued by South Australian Railways for each type third card from Adelaide to Kapunda Public School from Public School Murrayville SA, Sept. 22, 1914 (appears as a legitimate usage) (illustrated), (Kellow P24e, 24ea [2] [CV \$1000]). Used, somewhat toned and with faults, all very scarce. (3) \$200 Sold for \$180





Lot 3144 was described as: *Post card*, 1918-1919, 'three/halfpence' on a 1d kangaroo obsolete stock, used from Hobart 1 Oct 19, machine postmark, noted repaired spike hole and aged, (Kellow P49 [\$8000]). Used, extremely rare, one of three known. \$1,000 Sold for \$800





Lot 3147 was described as: Australia, Postal stationery, Post Cards on Hagner sheets, all punctured 'OS/NSW', and used by New South Wales Government Departments, 1d 1913-5 kangaroo, (Kellow P24eb, [2], P25e [1]), (3) all from the Govt. Printing Office issued 1915-1917 (one illustrated); 1 1/2d red brown KGV, 1930-1937 used 1937-8, used from Maritime Services Board of NSW and Lands Department, both with admonition 83.5mm (Kellow P67e); 1d green KGV, 1924-1925 issued from Lands Dept 1925 used to Corowa, die 3, (Kellow P62e); 1d green KGV 1925-1930 series (6) issued by Sydney Harbour Trust, Lands Dept., Main Roads Board (4) (one illustrated). (Kellow P64e). Fair - fine used. (12) \$500 Sold for \$850.


Lot 3122 had the unexpected description:

Australia and Australian States, Postal Stationery, an extraordinary accumulation of original postal stationery, many used, some unused that have all been enhanced with unofficial punctured letters 'OS (various sizes and sometimes reversed), G/NSW, OS NSW, T and other variations all illegally placed on these stationery items many years ago to create rarities, includes wrappers, post cards, lettercards, envelopes (including registered), ordinary letters etc. A one of a kind grouping with some duplication of unofficial punctured items, impossible to duplicate. Unused and used. (approx 200) \$300. Sold for \$1,700. 




